

1. Introduction

This report outlines my participation in an exchange program at **Karolinska Institutet (KI), Stockholm, Sweden**, undertaken as part of my medical training at **Makerere University College of Health Sciences**. The exchange aimed to provide international clinical exposure, strengthen academic and professional skills, and promote collaboration between the two institutions.

2. Duration of the Exchange Program

The exchange program ran from **23rd August to 25th October 2025**. Travel to Stockholm took place on **23rd August**, marking the official start of the program.

3. Orientation and Introduction Week

The first week of the program was dedicated to **introduction and orientation activities** for new students. These activities were organized largely by the **student unions at Karolinska Institute** and were aimed at integrating incoming students into the university system.

Activities during this week included welcome sessions, picnics, social gatherings, and guided **Stockholm city strolls**. These activities were important in helping us familiarize ourselves with the university environment, the city, and fellow students. The orientation period also provided an opportunity to form social networks that greatly eased adaptation to life in Sweden.

4. Academic and Clinical Rotations

4.1 Oncology Rotation

I undertook a **four-week oncology rotation**, from 2025-01-01 to 2025-09-28 which combined structured **e-learning modules**, tutorials, and hands-on clinical exposure. Learning activities were delivered through the university's online learning platform **Canvas** and in-person teaching sessions with Dr Lisa Vilaabona, the supervisor.

Clinical exposure included participation in oncology clinics, ward rounds, and multidisciplinary discussions. The rotation emphasized modern cancer management, including targeted cancer treatments, radiotherapy principles, and patient-centered oncology care.

A key component of this rotation was a **palliative care week at Stockholm Sjukhuset**, during which I participated in both inpatient and community-based palliative care. This included **home visits**, which provided valuable insight into holistic patient care, symptom control, and psychosocial support for patients with advanced malignancies.

4.2 Plastic Surgery Rotation

I was initially allocated to the **plastic surgery unit**, where I attended outpatient clinics and ward activities for a week. Unfortunately due to a positive MRSA screening, my access to the operating theatre was restricted. Despite this limitation, I gained exposure to patient assessment, postoperative care, and clinical decision-making within the unit.

4.3 Vascular Surgery Rotation

Following coordination between the international office and my supervisors, I was reallocated to the **vascular surgery unit** on short notice where I rotated for 3 weeks. This rotation proved highly educational and included exposure to vascular outpatient clinics, ward work, and operating theatre activities. I learned about the diagnosis and management of peripheral vascular disease, use of imaging modalities, and both open and endovascular procedures.

5. Informal Experience and Cultural Exposure

Stockholm was a highly enriching environment to live and learn in. The city is characterized by **numerous lakes, bridges, green spaces and colorful buildings**, which contribute to its unique beauty. The exchange took place during **autumn**, and the weather was generally mild and pleasant, allowing for extensive exploration of the city.

With support from the **Erasmus+ program**, which funded the exchange, I was able to travel, tour, and participate in cultural activities. Visits included museums such as the **Vasa Museum**, the **Nobel Prize Museum**, the **Royal Palace**, **Skansen** and **Baltic Sea Science centre** and recreational areas such as **Haga Parken**. Social activities with friends, including dining out and visiting local bars, further enriched the cultural experience.

Accommodation was located at KI Residence, Solna near **Karolinska University Hospital, Solna**, which allowed easy commuting. I used a **bicycle** as my primary means of transport, which proved convenient and enabled flexible exploration of the city.


